Charles O. Abernathy, Jr. was born on August 10, 1922 in Altus, Oklahoma to Charles O. Abernathy and Lillie Abernathy. He passed away Thursday, May 24, 2012, in his home with his family by his side. He graduated from school at Ozark High School in Jackson County. His family owned and operated a dairy east of Altus. Knowing he didn't want to milk cows two times a day for the rest of his life, he started farming land.

He believed serving his country was something he should do, so he enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1943 at the age of 20, just 10 days after he married Mary Lark Hudson in Altus, despite having received a farm deferment from the Selective Service.

Two years later, Mr. Abernathy and other members of the 27th Division of the 24th Army Corps participated in Operation Iceberg, the invasion on Okinawa, Japan, that began on Easter Sunday in 1945. Soon aft er landing on the island's beaches, the 27th Division found itself facing 100,000 Japanese troops while entrenched in caves and other fortifications on higher ground. During the ensuing battle, Mr. Abernathy was credited with saving the lives of many fellow soldiers, and he continued to fight for three more days despite a serious leg wound. Consequently, Mr. Abernathy was awarded the Silver Star for bravery and the Purple Heart for wounds received in combat.

Following the war, Mr. Abernathy returned to Oklahoma and to his wife, Mary, where they raised their children, Crystal and Clint. He also became a successful farmer and community supporter and devoted time on behalf of his fellow cotton producers by holding leadership positions at Headrick Coop Gin and Oklahoma Cotton Cooperative Association. In 1953, Mr. Abernathy was a founding member of the Wichita National Insurance Company, in Lawton and served on the Board of Directors until a few years ago.

In 1995, PCCA Delegates nominated Mr. Abernathy to represent District One on PCCA's Board of Directors where he served continuously for the next 12 years. During his tenure on the Board, PCCA's trade territory increased, and the cooperative continued its legacy of industry leadership and success for the benefit of its members.

Mr. Abernathy served on the Soil Conservation Board for Jackson County for 27 years. He was one of the founders and co-owners of Pioneer Farm Center. He was a member and supporter of the WOSC Aggie Club for many years. He was a long-time member of the First United Methodist Church in Altus, Oklahoma, where he served on many Committees, boards, and taught Sunday school. He was actively involved in the Gideons International. He and his wife, Mary, traveled many places in the world distributing Bibles and sharing God's word.

In his later years, he was a volunteer driver for the Disabled American Veterans. He would drive fellow veterans to doctor's appointments locally and around the state. Charles and Mary enjoyed traveling and watching the NBA on television. Papa Charles gained much enjoyment from spending time and watching his grandchildren grow into adults of whom he was very proud.

He is survived by his wife, Mary, of the home; one son Clint and his wife, Kim; two grandsons; Justin and wife, Amy; Jarod and wife, Jill and one granddaughter, Jordon Coppock and husband, Evan. Four great-grandchildren; Kason Charles Abernathy, Kenzie Cae Abernathy, Cade Jarod Abernathy, and Drake John Abernathy. The family would like to give a special thanks to his caretakers Amy, Brittiney, Mandy, J'Amy, and Amber.
