Honors to our Departed

One of my duties as Editor is to manage the "Taps" column listing obituaries of our departed comrades. As I was updating the master Taps log that the Association keeps, it struck me that many of our comrades may have slipped through the cracks and not been recognized. The past 20 years has been a turbulent time for the 27th and the Association. That time has also seen the aging out of the WWII veterans who formed the core of the Association for so many decades. It was gut wrenching to look up everyone and find that most had obituaries online. I ended up adding over 100 names to the Taps master log in the space of two days. I did check the Gallivanters I had on hand and some had already appeared in our printed Taps, so that was nice to see. In the end though I decided to come up with a way to honor all who had passed and I could confirm it in some manner. It soon came to me that a special edition publication completed to come out just after the winter holidays and at the same time as the Winter Gallivanter was going to be the method. I am striving to do honor to each

person based on their deeds, their service, and their units (as best as I am able to determine). I found that in many cases the family didn't really understand the military jargon too well when they submitted the obituary, so I hope that I don't have any errors. If I do, I take the responsibility for publishing this with small flaws. I feel the overall intent is well meant and I hope that anyone who finds a flaw will accept my apology. Another area where I am lacking data is the names of Association members who passed before the 27th Staff took over the running of the Association in the early 2000's. So what you will see in the following pages are those people on our roster from roughly 2001 to present.

A few brief administrative notes on the format of this document.

Where I saw that several Soldiers had served in the same battalion, I grouped them that way. I tried my best to state the nickname or motto of each battalion, but wasn't always successful.

That whole website is a huge resource and I highly recommend it to anyone who is interested in the history of NYS military forces.

In placing rank graphics, I generally used the highest rank achieved during service.

In placing award graphics, I had to rely on what was stated in the obituary or what we had in our mailing list.

In placing affiliation to a veterans' organization, I did that solely on the obituary (Except CPT Walsh, who was wearing a VFW cap in his photo).

There are so many members from the past that we don't have ranks, unit designations, or time served with the 27th. In the future I will try to rectify that in some manner, but I am uncertain how.

Finally, as I put this document together I was struck by the nature of the stories of these Soldiers. Most growing up through the Depression and going off to serve their country. Whether in the Pacific, North Africa, or Europe, thousands of miles from wherever they called home. Then coming home and building a life for themselves. Often they are stated as being leaders, whether in business, administration, in various organizations, or all of the above. They knew the value of hard work and teamwork. They saw what people committed to a worthy cause could achieve. I can't help but admire each and every one of these

people.



Felix Martin Giuffre of Williamsburg, VA was born on November 11, 1917 and passed away on April 10, 2011. He served during World War II in the US Army at the rank of Sergeant in Company A, 1st Battalion, 105th Infantry Regiment, 27th Infantry Division (New York).

His combat action on Saipan was described in the book entitled "Battling for Saipan" by Francis A. O'Brien. On the History Channel this program revisits July 7, 1944, when 4,000 Japanese soldiers launched the largest suicide charge of World War II against the New York National Guard's 105th Infantry Regiment during the fight for the Island of Saipan. The program is part of National Geographic Channel's "Day Under Fire: WWII" series. Sgt. Felix Giuffre from Brooklyn is shot four times. Sgt. Giuffre began trying to move himself to the aid station.

Captain Love's book states that Private Joseph Gomes came running by at the time and saw Giuffre moving an inch or two at a time, literally tearing huge chunks of ground out with his hands as he tried to pull himself along. Sgt. Giuffre found himself in the middle of the minefield. Gomes, saying "to hell with it," jumped into the minefield, and carried Giuffre out of it and back into the perimeter.

Morton A. Gregg, 87, of Pinecrest, passed away on September 27, 2011. Born in Detroit, Michigan on July 14, 1924, Mort attended Hillsdale College in Michigan but his education was interrupted by World War II. Having hernia surgery in order to enlist, Mort joined the Army, 105th Infantry Regiment, 27th Division. Rising from the rank of private to first sergeant, Mort fought in two of the bloodiest battles of the war in Saipan and Okinawa. Recipient of two Bronze Stars, two Purple Hearts and nominated for a Silver Star for valor.

Mort moved his family to Miami from Detroit after being discharged from the service. Rising from a humble upbringing, Mort was a true businessman at heart as he founded and co-owned Acme Gas Corporation for 44 years. He was also involved with Artex Aluminum, New Mark Glen Mobile Home Park, Oriole Homes, Nayton's Restaurant and Syfo Water, among others. Mort loved to hang out, smoke a big cigar and shoot the breeze with friends.

Survived by his son Richard and daughter-in-law and caregiver Mindi, his son Bruce, daughter-in-law Wanda and three grandchildren, his brother Mickey and sister-in-law Mindy, his wife Sue and aunt Elizabeth.









Nicholas H. Grinaldo, 92, passed away Friday evening, November 9th at the Eddy Village Green in Cohoes. Born on November 1, 1920 to the late Samuel and Grace (DiStefano) Grinaldo, Nick enlisted in the NY National Guard, Company C, 105th Infantry on February 27, 1940 and served with the 27th Infantry Division. In 1944, during the Battle of Saipan, Nick sustained injuries to his shoulder from machine gun fire, as well as shrapnel in his hip, earning him 2 Purple Hearts. Among the other medals awarded for Nick's service and bravery were the Bronze Star, NYS Conspicuous Service Star, Asian-Pacific Campaign Medal and several others. Nick was honorably discharged in 1945 at the rank of Staff-Sergeant.

After proudly serving his country, Nick returned to Troy where for 35 years (1953-1988) he operated Nick's Shoe Store, on the corner of Douw & Douw & River Streets. The store was opened in 1917 by his uncle and was originally named, Trojan Quick Shoe Repair.

During his lifetime Nick was an active member of several organizations including the Military Order of the Purple Heart, Tibbits Cadets, Emerald A.C., the Italian Community Center, the Troy Central Rod and Gun Club and the American Legion.

Julius F. Kovalaski, 83, died Nov. 17 at Charlotte Hungerford Hospital. "He was a wonderful man," Gina Kovalaski, his wife of 26 years, said Saturday. "I'll miss him terribly." Julius, or "Jules," as he was known to family and friends, was born in Brookfield on June 20, 1922.

At the age of 17, he enlisted in the U.S. Army on Oct. 27, 1939, and saw action in the Pacific theater during World War II. Kovalaski took a bullet while protecting a general in Okinawa, Japan, on April 28, 1945, and eventually received a Purple Heart. He also received a Bronze Star among several other military honors during his service.

After the war, Kovalaski worked as an advocate for veterans until his death, his family said. "The military was his thing," Gina Kovalaski said.

Kovalaski was honored as the grand marshal of the Memorial Day parade last May and was a sergeant with the Connecticut State Guard Reserve Military Final Honors Squad of Northwestern Connecticut, providing final honors at the gravesides of more than 1,000 veterans. "Now someone will do it for him," said his stepdaughter, Valerie Royals.

In addition to working tirelessly for area veterans, Kovalaski will be remembered as a devoted man who always supported his family. "We were always together," Gina Kovalaski said. Royals shared a special moment with her stepfather, she said, driving him along the street in the Memorial Day Parade in a 1957 Thunderbird. "I said to him, 'You're the celebrity of the day," Royals said. "We led the parade."

Kovalaski never earned a high school diploma because of his military service, but was given an honorary diploma from Torrington High School in June 2004, Royals said. Kovalaski served as commander for the New Milford chapter of the Military Order of the Purple Heart. His assistant in that organization, Ed Farrell, 80, of Warren, said Kovalaski was always on the go and working for veterans. "He loved veterans," Farrell said. "For a man his age to do (all) that, you have to take your hat off to him." Farrell, a U.S. Marine who also saw action in World War II, said Kovalaski shared a kinship with his branch of the service, fighting side by side with the Marines at Saipan. "I told him he was a frustrated Marine," Farrell said. "He just grinned."

Aside from his work with the military, Kovalaski worked for the Torrington Company, was a fireman with the Torrington Fire Department for 25 years, and also worked as a security guard for Timex in Torrington, according to the family. Recently, Kovalaski and his wife went to see the new World War II Memorial in Washington D.C., Royals said. "He was waiting to see it," Royals said. "It was all he talked about (when he returned home)." Kovalaski shared stories from his service with school children at Torrington Middle School, where his 14-year-old granddaughter, Natalie Royals, attends.



Alejandro R. Ruiz Sr., an Army infantryman during World War II who received the Medal of Honor for single-handedly storming a Japanese machine gun bunker -- twice -- during the Battle of Okinawa, died of congestive heart failure 20 November, 2009 at a hospital in Napa, CA. He was 85.

On April 28, 1945, in the last months of the war, the private first class deployed to Okinawa on a mission with his platoon, seeking remnants of a Japanese battalion hiding in fortified emplacements on steep ridges near the village of Gasukuma. During World War II, the conquest of the Japanese island of Okinawa was considered vital for the Allied forces as a step towards an invasion of the Japanese mainland. The invasion (codenamed Operation Iceberg) was the largest amphibious operation of the Pacific war, and involved units of the U.S. Tenth Army, commanded by Lieutenant General Simon Bolivar Buckner, Jr. These units consisted of III Amphibious Corps (1st and 6th Marine Divisions, with 2nd Marine Division as an afloat reserve), and XXIV Corps (7th, 77th, 96th and 27th Infantry Divisions).

Medal of Honor

Rank and organization: Private First Class, U.S. Army, 165th Infantry, 27th Infantry Division.

Place and date: Okinawa, Ryukyu Islands, 28 April 1945.

Citation: When his unit was stopped by a skillfully camouflaged enemy pillbox, he displayed conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity above and beyond the call of duty. His squad, suddenly brought under a hail of machinegun fire and a vicious grenade attack, was pinned down. Jumping to his feet, Pfc. Ruiz seized an automatic rifle and lunged through the flying grenades and rifle and automatic fire for the top of the emplacement. When an enemy soldier charged him, his rifle jammed. Undaunted, Pfc. Ruiz whirled on his assailant and clubbed him down.

Then he ran back through bullets and grenades, seized more ammunition and another automatic rifle, and again made for the pillbox. Enemy fire now was concentrated on him, but he charged on, miraculously reaching the position, and in plain view he climbed to the top. Leaping from one opening to another, he sent burst after burst into the pillbox, killing 12 of the enemy and completely destroying the

position. Pfc. Ruiz's heroic conduct, in the face of overwhelming odds, saved the lives of many comrades and eliminated an obstacle that long would have checked his unit's advance.

On 26 June 1946, President Harry S. Truman presented Ruiz with the Medal of Honor in a ceremony held at the White House. He spent his career in the Army. He also served in the Korean War and retired as a master sergeant in the mid-1960s. Ruiz often recounted the circumstances that led to his Army service. As a teenager working in odd jobs for a cattle farmer in Carlsbad, N.M., he had been asked to drive a cow to another farm when he became distracted by thoughts of a girlfriend. He drove, with the cow in tow, straight to Barstow, Texas, 122 miles away, to woo the young woman into marrying him. Ruiz was detained, and a judge told him that he would either be sent to jail for stealing the cow, or he could enlist in the Army to stay out of trouble.

He chose the Army.

Survivors include two children from his first marriage, Celia Ruiz and Alejandro Ruiz Jr., both of Berkeley; a sister; seven grandchildren; and six great -grandchildren.





Felix "Fritz" Neubauer, 90, arrived at the Happy Hunting Grounds September 20, 2010. He passed away peacefully surrounded by his family. Born Nov. 7, 1919, in Austria, Fritz immigrated to the United States with his mother and sister in 1927. As a young man he made his living as a fur trapper, then started and operated the legendary Neubauer's Fur, Fish and Game Farm in Newbury for more than 50 years. He was an avid outdoorsman and outspoken proponent of land and wildlife conservation issues.

Fritz was a decorated World War II veteran, serving as an Army Ranger in The Pacific Theater from 1941 to 1944, until he was wounded in the Battle of Saipan. He received a Purple Heart, Bronze Star and Combat Infantryman Badge.

"Fritz Neubauer was a legendary trapper, hunter and angler," said D'Arcy Egan, Plain Dealer outdoors columnist. "He was also the consummate conservationist, keeping the wildlife of Geauga County in perfect balance. He was fearless, whether swimming a frozen river to recover a large-antlered buck or confronting someone who violated his rules of hunting. A legion of city kids listened to Fritz Neubauer's call of the wild, learning to hunt and fish from the master."

Reno "Jay" Reda, retired state wildlife officer, said, "He was at times the best of friends and at times the most challenging of wildlife foes." Reda opposed Neubauer's war on raccoons but admired his love for their victims: game birds. One day, Reda's beloved retriever vanished. That night, Neubauer stopped by in a snowstorm. "Here this gruff, rough mountain-mannish kind of guy shows up with a Labrador retriever puppy and says, 'You take care of my dog until yours comes home.'

He said he started hunting, fishing and trapping as a toddler in his native Austria. When he grew tired, an uncle toted him by backpack.

Having poor vision, he memorized the eye chart and qualified for the Army for World War II. He fought for three years in the South Pacific and took a bullet in his right arm, the strong one, at Saipan. A colonel ordered a lieutenant to amputate. The lieutenant saved the arm instead. Neubauer went to a hospital in Michigan and strengthened the arm through fly-fishing.

He stayed in a cabin in Geauga County with dirt floors and no electricity. He gradually bought or leased about 2,000 marshy acres, built dams, dug ditches, and stocked the area with pheasants, mallards, bass, trout and more. Neubauer claimed to meet his first wife by reeling her boat in. He later married Helen Halle of the department store family. She'd coax him from the marsh to the opera. He'd slip out between acts to Pat Joyce's Tavern. Survivors are his daughter, Jamie (Jerry) Davis of Burton; son, Fritz (Jane) Neubauer Jr. of Chardon; grandsons, Fritzel III and Sam; nieces, Ann (Keith) Elliott and Lynn (Bob) Munson; former wife, Dolores "Dee"; and eight stepchildren.
