# The 27th Division Came Marching Home



The Parades

Many of us have marched in a parade at one time or another and I know we all have taken part in the traditional "Pass and Review" with our unit. In our home towns the Veterans Day, Memorial Day, the 4<sup>th</sup> of July parades have always been big parades to march in. I am sure everyone who has taken part in these events have gotten that proud feeling when you are marching along the parade route, the crowd is clapping and cheering, kids are waving little American Flags, you pass in front of the announcers stand and they introduce your outfit to the crowd and they clap and cheer even louder.

Looking back, the 108<sup>th</sup> Infantry Regiment had taken part in two parades of epic proportion while serving with the 27<sup>th</sup> Division.

#### "Send Off

The 27<sup>th</sup> Division marched in the "Send Off" Parade in New York City, on August 30, 1917, prior to the Division's shipment to CampWadsworth, to begin combat training for the World War. The entire 27<sup>th</sup> Division, about 20,000, marched the parade route down 5<sup>th</sup> Ave-

nue from 110<sup>th</sup> Street to the Washington Arch, at Washington Square Park. Many of the officers and men that were present were veterans of the divisions' federal service in the Mexican Border just a few months earlier.

The entire route was lined with family members and spectators. "Apparently it was realized by the people along the parade route that many of the officers and men in the passing column would not live through the war to take part in any homecoming parade, for sadness was more notable upon the faces of the spectators than enthusiasm. The officers and men, however, were in fine spirits and made a most soldierly impression in their swing down Fifth



Avenue."

At the end of the "Send Off" Parade many of the units marched directly to the departing trains, heading to Camp Wadsworth. Nine Months later they were in France.

#### "Home-Coming"

In February 1919, three months after the War was over, the officers and men of the 27th Division returned home aboard transport ships and sailed up to the Hoboken piers. Most of the Division was aboard the Leviathan but a majority of the 108th was aboard the Mauretania Liner. These boys were returning heroes and were met in the bay by escort ships and at the docks by crowds of cheering people, bands playing, and whistles blowing. The divisions accomplishments in Europe were well known by everyone here at home and they referred to the division as "O'Ryan's Roughnecks" "The Glorious 27th" "The New York Division" and "New York's Own". They were now famous for their part in breaking the Hindenburg Line and it was printed in all of the newspapers here at home.



# **27th Division Came Marching Home**

(Continued from Page 1) When the Division arrived, it was made known to General O'Ryan that a Parade in their honor was to be arranged and that is was to be an extraordinary event. The Division HQ was temporarily established at the Biltmore Hotel in the City of New York and the plans for the parade were underway. During the time of planning the men and officers of the 27<sup>th</sup> were banqueted and entertained all around the city in its many hotels and establishments.

"A great arch had been erected at Madison Square and another at Fifth Avenue and 60th Street. At night powerful searchlights illuminated these structures." The arch at 60th Street was covered with crystal glass, which reflected the beams of the searchlights in such manner as to present an astonishing appearance. At the New York Public Library, on Fifth Ave near 42<sup>nd</sup> Street, an Altar of Liberty had been built. Before the altar were grouped "long battle pikes" of an ancient design and shields bearing the 27<sup>th</sup> Division insignia. "These were said to represent the warlike armament o the returning soldiers, which had been laid upon the Altar of Liberty."



It was decided that the route would be the opposite of the 1917 farewell parade and start in Washington Square Park, travel up Fifth Avenue and be dismissed at 110<sup>th</sup> Street. The order of march was arranged to be led by a memorial feature of the parade was a caisson drawn by eight black horses with the caisson loaded with flowers and wreaths. Following was a column of several thou-

sand wounded soldiers of the Division in open automobiles along with huge banner bearing 1986 gold stars, representing the number of men killed in battle or have died of wounds. Then came the Division led by the Police Band of NYC.

Thousands of people had taken up spectator positions the prior evening to insure an excellent vantage point. Tens of thousands continued to arrive and the crowds exceeded all calculations that had been made by the police.

"The parade started on the minute of the time prescribed. The great number of wounded soldiers, many of them carrying crutches, others with arms and heads still bandaged, created a tremendous impression as they proceeded up Fifth Avenue. There was little cheering. The great crowd seemed spellbound. Their emotion was too deep for cheers. This emotion was produced no only by the sight of so many wounded soldiers, a column of them, more than a mile long, but also by the memorial caisson and the service flag with 1986 gold stars, which headed the parade." In the area of Madison Square the amount of spectators became so vast that they surged out into the street causing the parade column to narrow. When the last wounded soldier cleared the Washington Square the Division Staff, along with the Division units followed.

"As the troops appeared on Fifth Ave. the vast crowd seemed to experience reactions from the emotion which had held them while they viewed the caisson, the service flag and the wounded. With appearance of the troops in their steel helmets, fixed bayonets and packs, swinging along with the stride of hardened outdoor men, their bronzed faces showing the lines which bespoke the determination that had marked their battle conduct, the multitude became frantic with cheers." Every vantage point all along the route was packed, including the side streets. Confetti and ticker tape was thrown from roof tops and windows until the air was filled with the cheerful rain. Great numbers of horns and noise makers added to the din.

The masses at Madison

Square in the vicinity of the great arch became so out of hand that they engulfed the street blocking the route. It took several minutes for the police reform a lane sufficient enough for the parade column to pass through. "The column proceeded up Fifth Ave. and passed the Alter of Liberty, receiving the same extraordinary welcome and amid the same scenes that



they had received in lower Fifth Avenue." When the head of the column reached 110<sup>th</sup> Street, the Division Staff pulled aside and took up positions in the plaza. General O'Ryan watched his war time Division for the last time pass and review. At that time the 54<sup>th</sup> Infantry Brigade, headed by General Pierce, began to swing by. General Pierce then joined the Division Commander to watch his Brigade. "It was a magnificent spectacle to see the 108<sup>th</sup> Infantry and 107<sup>th</sup> Infantry of his brigade to march past this last reviewing point of the parade. It was a sad occasion also; for this review marked the disintegration of this Great War organization with its superlative men and associations that had become a part of the daily routine of life."

The units continued to pass and in the end they disappeared into the side streets and traveled to their camps and armories.

The following day all units of the division were located at either Camp Upton or en route to, for final mustering out. By the end of April the last unit had been mustered out of federal service thus ending the war service of the "New York" or 27<sup>th</sup> Division during the World War.





# **Orion in Space?**

(Editor's Note: On August 31, 2006, NASA announced a new manned space program.)

America will send a new generation of explorers to the moon aboard NASA's Orion crew exploration vehicle. Making its first flights early in the next decade, Orion is part of the Constellation Program to send human explorers back to the moon, and then onward to Mars and other destinations in the solar system.

A component of the Vision for Space Exploration, Orion's development is taking place in parallel with missions to complete the International Space Station using the space shuttle before the shuttle is retired in 2010.



Orion will be capable of carrying crew and cargo to the space station. It will be able to rendezvous with a lunar landing module and an Earth departure stage in low-Earth orbit to carry crews to the moon and, one day, to Mars-bound vehicles assembled in low-Earth orbit. Orion will be the Earth entry vehicle for lunar and Mars returns. Orion's design will borrow its shape from the capsules of the past, but takes advantage of 21st century technology in computers, electronics, life support, propulsion and heat protection systems.

Lockheed Martin Corp was awarded the contract to build Orion on Aug. 31, 2006.

The vehicle is Orion, named for one of the brightest and most recognizable star formations in the sky. It will be a multipurpose capsule -- the central member of a family of spacecraft and shuttle-derived launchers that NASA's Constellation Program is developing to carry astronauts back to the moon and later to Mars. The first flight with astronauts aboard is planned for no later than 2014. Orion's first flight to the moon is planned for no later than 2020.

(Final note: The Editor's cousin works for NASA and has been contacted concerning establishing a connection with the 27th and the Orion program.)

# **Sharing Their Stories**

SARATOGA SPRINGS - As he patted the shoulder of the 24-year-old National Guard specialist Ben Munn inside the Military Museum on Saturday, National Guard Ray Swift, a National Guard veteran, noticed the patch of the 27th National Guard Division on Munn's shoulder. "It was the same patch I sewed on in 1950," Swift said. "I was 16 years old. But they didn't ask for birth certificates back then."

Two generations of veterans shared their stories at the annual reunion of the 27th Division Association at the New York State Military History Museum on Saturday morning. Citizen soldiers from the modern-day 27th Infantry Brigade Combat Team got to meet and exchange experiences with about three dozen World War II National Guard Veterans.

They all wore the 27th Division shoulder patch, decorated with the Orion constellation and honoring of the World War I Commander John O'Ryan.

Young and old National Guard Veterans toured the museum and

compared stories from Saipan and Okinawa to those from Baghdad and Samarra. At a memorial ceremony outside the museum, they honored together the fallen soldiers who wore the 27th Division shoulder patch in Europe, the Pacific and Southwest Asia.

"World War II veterans are getting older and it is important to give them an opportunity to meet the newest generation," said National Guard Major Richard Goldenberg.

Goldenberg returned from Iraq in Nov. 2005. He found that World War II veterans would easily understand how American soldiers in Iraq were welcomed as liberators by the Iraqi Kurds, while many Iraqis looked at them with suspicion. World War II veterans experienced the same contrasting attitudes when they crossed from France into Germany, he said. "There is much that ties us together," he said. "The New York National Guard is like a family."

As all other major army divisions, the 27th was formed during World War I. Every division was assigned a number, with one through 25 were assigned to active duty and 26 to 41 were National Guards. Number 27 was the New York state division. Later, the division became known for breaking the famed Hindenburg Line of German Defenses in September 1918

Jean Jackson, 78, who came to the event with her husband Tiny, a World War II veteran, used the chance to talk to Ben Munn, who came back from duty in Iraq in 2005. "I wanted to know if they have the equipment to do the job," Jackson said. "We have four children, ten grandchildren and ten greatgrandchildren. One of our grandchildren is in the Coast Guard in D.C. As a grandmother, I want to know."
